Fire Chief's Message



In January of 2012, the Kennebecasis Valley Board of Fire Commissioners approved the 2012-2016 Strategic Plan for the Kennebecasis Valley Fire Department Inc. The strategic plan contains an updated Vision and Mission statement and is focused on six strategic imperatives that will provide direction for the Department over the next five years. This annual report has been produced to support the strategic imperative of Enhanced Governance and provides a means for the Department to present annual performance oriented information to our important stakeholders. It is with great pleasure that I present the 2012 Kennebecasis Valley Fire Department Annual Report which summarizes the Department's activities in 2012.

During the past year the Department continued to expand and improve upon its incident mitigation deployment model. In October, two full-time firefighter positions were added to increase the full-time complement to thirty-two paid firefighters. This staffing complement balances our service level between the two communities by permitting the department to operate twenty-four hours a day, seven days per week with at least four firefighters on-duty at each of our two fire stations. In December, the Department adopted a new on-call model for our twenty-four volunteer firefighters that will make more efficient use of their services and provide more structure to our emergency response system.

Through strategic planning, the Kennebecasis Valley Fire Department began the process of ensuring that our resources and capabilities are properly aligned with the community's needs and expectations. We are now using data, best practices and evidence based outcomes to move our department forward. With the ongoing support of the Board of Fire Commissioners, both Mayor's and their respective Councils we can continue this positive progressive transformation towards becoming recognized as a "first class" fire service.

Over the past five years the Department administration services have been provided by the Town of Quispamsis. I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the significant contribution that Mr. Michael Brennan and his staff have made to the Department and the Board of Fire Commissioners during his term as Board Administrator.

Winston Churchill once said that "sometimes it is not enough to do our best; sometimes we must do what is required". Over the past year it has been a tremendous honour to lead a devoted, talented and exemplary team of firefighters who always do what is "required".

In the spring of 2012 we received word that our beloved brother Jack Logan would be recognized as a line of duty death and will be forever memorialized on the Fallen Firefighters Memorial in Colorado Springs. On September 10th, during the week of recognition for fire fighter deaths, Local 3591 hosted a memorial to honour our fallen brother.

As public servants, who see our citizens in distressed situations on a daily basis, our members commit to making a difference within our communities, out of respect for people whom are less fortunate or in need. In 2012, we were able to raise over \$18,000.00 dollars in fundraising in which various charities will be receiving funding in hopes of making a difference within our two communities.

Lastly, I would be remiss if I did not say how proud I am that this Local alongside the Management team of the KVFD and the Executive Board of the Volunteer Association have fostered a relationship second to none across this great country. A Department and a Union cannot be productive if relations do not remain open minded, respectful, and are able to overcome adversity together. I am very proud of this department and our agencies as we share a great respect for one another, and strive to make this department the best department it can possibly be.

In closing, I feel it is important that we use this year as a building block, this is a lifetime commitment for our members and citizens and it is imperative that great consideration is given to both when determining the future of the Fire Service. Operations Division

2012 was another busy year for the Operations Division. Our emergency response totals for 2012 are consistent with historical averages and were highlighted by a spectacular wind-driven residential fire that quickly consumed a two-storey home and threatened neighbouring properties. It is not often that we find such an overwhelming challenge upon arrival in the "core" area of our response district. Our ability to contain this fire and prevent it from spreading serves to validate the operational structure and systems we have implemented to improve our operations.

In April, we awarded a contract to Fort Garry Fire Trucks for the construction and delivery of a new crew cab, 2500 gallon water tanker. Delivery of this new vehicle is expected early in 2013 and this will complete the renewal of our front-line fleet. The next major apparatus purchase is not expected until 2020. Our new equipment purchases included new ice rescue suits, new high-volume hose, the complete replacement of our portable radio batteries, and specialized storage/transport units for our breathing air cylinders.

The division of operations requires the combined efforts of all members of our department to provide both rapid and efficient response to all emergencies. Our new personnel notification system used for second alarm emergencies has now been in effect for a full year and has proven to be both practical and cost effective. The text message notification system was initiated by Volunteer Firefighter Matthew McQuade and sends off-duty firefighters a text message when additional staffing is required due to an emergency incident within the community.

Bravo Company took the initiative to research various hose loads being used in the fire service as part of a trial designed to assess the efficiency in deployment of hose lines for fire attack. The Cleveland Hose Load was found to work the best and provides a quick and safe single firefighter deployment model for our attack lines. This load will speed up the deployment of the hose to the front door and eliminate kinks from occurring. All of our apparatus have been re-loaded to include this style of hose load.



I would like to express my thanks to the staff for their dedication and hard work. We look forward to meeting the many challenges that 2013 will bring.

Significant Events



April 17th – Cameron Road

A second alarm was immediately called for this confirmed structure fire at 10:06 hrs. While on route to the scene the communications center provided an update explaining that a passerby had knocked on the door with no answer and reported that smoke was coming from the eaves. No one was home at the time.



August 30th – Motor Vehicle Accident Eastbound Highway 1, at 14:03 hrs, a truck pulling a

float trailer with a mini excavator and a compactor flipped over after the trailer uncoupled from the truck.



June 17th – Seventh Street

Father's Day plans were interrupted by a late afternoon fire that caused significant damage to this mobile home. Crews had to remove exterior cladding and use large volume hose lines to suppress this stubborn blaze.



Sept 9th- Devonshire Crescent

At 02:30 hrs, KVFD responded to a fully involved residential fire while police simultaneously began evacuating nearby residents. The family was home sleeping when the fire started but were woken up by a neighbour after his daughter alerted him of the fire and all safely exited the home. KVFD utilized mutual aid for water supply from Hampton Fire Department, Nauwigewauk Fire Department and two tankers from the Saint John Fire Department. As well, a second alarm for additional firefighters.



Significant Events



Disabled Man Saved From Fire

In the early morning hours of October 20, 2013, the Kennebecasis Valley Fire Department responded to a report of a possible structure fire at 695 Hampton Road in Quispamsis. Lieutenant James LeBlanc, who was the officer in charge of the first due apparatus, recognized the address from previous medical first responder calls to the home and knew that the owner was wheelchair bound and lived alone.

The house was located up a long driveway behind a row of trees and was not visible from the street. Lt. LeBlanc and Firefighter Mark Richardson proceeded on foot to the home to investigate, as they approached, they could smell smoke and see the glow of flames through the front window of the residence.

The occupant was found in his wheelchair near the front of the home within feet of the fire. The fire had spread from a chair across the floor to the wall and ceiling. Initially, they attempted to remove the victim from his chair to carry him but couldn't lift him as his clothing was caught on a part of his wheelchair. Lieutenant LeBlanc and Firefighter Richardson were forced to stand and face even higher temperatures so that they could remove him from the home by pushing his wheelchair. They retraced their path to the back door where the wheelchair ramp was located. This was difficult due to the congestion in the home. Once the victim was out of the home, they then wheeled him approximately 100 yards to the street and assisted with placing him on a stretcher and into a waiting ambulance. He was suffering from smoke inhalation and burns. He spent three days in the ICU and survived the incident.

Although the decision to enter the structure fell within the parameters of our department's risk/benefit analysis model, the actions of the firefighters did require them to enter an immediately dangerous to life and health environment without the protection of a hose line which placed them at considerable personal risk. Based on the recommendation by Deputy Chief McCoy, who is a Board member for the New Brunswick Association of Fire Chiefs Medal of Valour Program, Lieutenant LeBlanc and Firefighter Richardson have been nominated for the Certificate of Courage based on their display of exceptionally meritorious conduct while in the performance of duty.



Fire Safety Hero Award

On September 9th shortly after 02:30 hrs, Alex Russell, a 10-year-old student, awoke to the crackling sound of fire coming from her neighbours house. She immediately recognized the seriousness of the situation and alerted her parents. Her father, Scott Russell, quickly ran to their neighbours house to alert them of the fire while her mother, Natalie Russell, dialed 911.

On September 21st members of KVFD visited Lakefield Elementary School and presented Alex with an award certificate in front of her classmates. The "Fire Safety Hero Award" is given to children who use fire safety information they have learned in school in real life emergency situations to save themselves or others.





Fire Prevention Division



The Kennebecasis Valley Fire Department has been very active in public fire prevention education efforts over the last year. One significant initiative to enhance awareness within our community was the rehabilitation of our public elementary school program. This initiative involved the complete restructuring of both the department's class room fire safety curriculum as well as the reorganization of department station tours. The complete education initiative saw department changes both internally and externally and standardized all fire and life safety education conducted by KVFD.

The fire safety behaviour objectives taught throughout our public school system and station tours varied in depth according to the age of the child. The lesson plans were presented to each individual class room, in an effort to decrease the teacher-to-student ratio, providing increased interaction with each child. Safety behaviors taught included:

- Recognize the firefighter as a helper.
- Demonstrate crawling under smoke.
- Demonstrate match and lighter safety.
- Demonstrate Stop, Drop and Roll.
- Demonstrate how to cool a burn.
- State you must "Get Out and Stay Out".
- Identify two ways out of each room.
- Describe the procedure for reporting an emergency.

After completing the lessons, the students have an understanding of basic fire safety behaviours as well as what a basic home escape plan consists of. This specific program was designed to target children, one of the most high risk age groups in regards to fire safety.

A major challenge in public education is the ability to reach each of the various age groups within our community with safety information. To help reach another high risk age group, our department participated in the Rothesay Regional Police Force's Seniors Police Academy educational workshop and attended numerous local senior citizen residential complexes to conduct fire safety seminars.

A new initiative this year to improve our outreach was the use of social media to aid in the dissemination of public fire safety information. The department now has active accounts on both Facebook and Twitter. This new use of technology has proven to be a cost effective method of providing immediate public updates on product recalls, information on fire safety behaviours as well as a method of advertising our department's public events. Our followers have also experienced quick responses to questions regarding fire safety involving smoke alarms and fire extinguishers in their homes.

The Open House is an annual event when members of the public are encouraged to tour the fire station and sit inside various types of emergency response vehicles. Members of the department provide continuous tours of the fire station, presentations on how to properly don firefighter personal protective equipment as well as a review of smoke alarm safety and how to crawl under smoke. There is a free barbeque, fire safety information pamphlets and handouts for children. A new addition to this year's event was a free extrication equipment demonstration at 13:00 hrs. During this

event, 150 visitors gathered to watch various emergency rescue extrication techniques performed on a vehicle in the stations rear parking lot. Inside the station, with the help of their parents, children used a wooden prop to practice exiting their bedroom through a window and then safely descending down a ladder. Approximately 400 people visited the fire station in only three hours.



Firefighter for a Day Contest

In 2012, our community had 390 grade three students and all were provided with information about the "Firefighter for a Day" contest. To enter, students must complete a home fire escape plan for their residence. This year, 108 students entered the contest compared to last year's 67. Many school teachers demonstrated their support for the program by assigning the home escape plan as homework for their students.

This year's "Firefighter for a Day" winner was eight-year-old Nathan Fawkes from Lakefield Elementary School. He was an honorary firefighter at station 1 on November 2nd. In the photo to the left, Firefighter Shane Day demonstrates how to use a fire hose with winner Nathan Fawkes . The participation of each firefighter on-duty allowed the student to become an active part of the crew.







Training Division

In 2012, many changes were made in the delivery format of all department training initiatives. In an effort to provide consistency within the department, each of the training objectives and lesson plans were developed in advance and distributed to each of the department's four firefighter companies. The training was then facilitated by the eight certified fire instructors throughout the department.

The delivery of numerous core firefighter skill lessons and exercises were broken down by shift so one topic was covered during each shift rotation. All of the training conducted can be divided into three segments: medical training (including initial and required ongoing education), fire suppression/technical rescue (including fire behavior, extrication, ice rescue etc.), and special operations (including incident command, aerial operations, reading smoke, etc.). The Department conducted over 484 working hours of training which consisted of 45 classes.

In an effort to enhance firefighter safety and personalize training to meet our needs; this year, firefighters built an in-house training prop called the "Firefighter Bail-out". This prop allows crews to practice various types of rescue maneuvers and also provides the ability for firefighters to train indoors during inclement weather. This simple project was a cost effective method of keeping training new and interesting and is also something that can be reused annually in both training and public event demonstrations.



In 2012 we were pleased to welcome cadets from Nova Scotia Firefighters School and Holland College to complete their on-the-job training with our department. These eight cadets were each assigned to one of our four companies and then paired with a mentor for an eight week period. This training program consisted of a combination of lecture and practical delivery and covers a number of areas including proper use of personal protective equipment, self-contained breathing apparatus training, hose evolutions, search and rescue and truck operations.

In late December, we upgraded our "Sayre Room" with the purchase of a SMART Board to aid with the lecture sessions of our training program. We are committed to the improvement of skills of our firefighters and we continue to develop a plan for the current, on-going and future needs of our department. This new technology enhances our ability to not only protect ourselves but also the people within our community.
